

Symposium Friday and Saturday July 4 and 5 2014

Le Mouvement is a multipart exhibition, which investigates the nature of public sculpture and public space by hosting a series of performances in the town of Biel/Bienne. The show touches upon a variety of inter-related topics and issues, which include the nature and uses of public space; art in public space; the individual and shared body in public space, both static and in movement; and the relationship between the fleeting materiality of the body and the more permanent materiality of sculpture. Uniting a heterogeneous group of art historians, theorists, curators and artists to discuss these points, the symposium intends to harness the knowledge of these different disciplines in hopes of gaining a greater and more nuanced understanding of performance in public space and the current nature of public space itself.

Italian, Paris-based artist Alex Cecchetti is a storyteller whose work manifests in performance, writing and the creation of narrative objects. Here he has been paired with Olivier Mosset's contribution to the 10th edition of the ESS SPA, *Untitled (A Paul Cézanne*) 2000 – an empty plinth – in front of which he presents a solo choreography, as if the sculpture came to life and walked off the plinth. Initially performed by him and then passed along, like a baton, to local performers, the choreography weaves a community of performers into the community of Biel/Bienne.

Ariana Reines, *Mortal Combat* (2014) + Carl Burckhardt, *Tänzer* (1920) et Max Bill, *Rhythmus im Raum* (1954–2008)

The US-born, New York-based poet and sometimes performer is known for her linguistic virtuosity, honesty and trenchancy. For Le Mouvement, she has been paired with Max Bill's abstract work *Rhythm in Space* (1954–2008) and Carl Burkhardt's figurative piece *The Dancer* (1954), two historic works which deal with movement in very different ways. Reines has conceived a kung-fu based performance that will be carried out with another performer vis-à-vis the sculptures, and which reflects some of the conflicts that productively animate art history, such as between abstraction and figuration, not to mention public, urban space itself.

The 12th edition of the Swiss Sculpture Exhibition kicks off with a reconfiguration of sculptures from former editions. Different representations of the human body in movement are investigated in a juxtaposition of sculpture and performance. monumental, abstract multi-colored sculpture Farbige Baumruine (1975). Lulic's choreography, which consists of a combination of poses, dancerly moves and every day actions, seeks to address the absurdity of the monument in the classical sense, while acknowledging the necessity of commemoration, and ultimately invests the workers of what is very much a working class town, Biel/Bienne, with a symbolic visibility.

Christian Jankowski, *Kunstturnen* (2014) + Various sculptures in public space

German, Berlin-based artist Christian Jankowski (b. 1968) has a tendency to humorously and critically redeploy existing structures and thereby examine how they operate, often deflating their seriousness at the same time. In keeping with this tendency, he has invited an expert from the National Sports Academy in Magglingen to create an exercise routine using public sculptures around the city of Biel/ Bienne, and as such, temporarily transform them from static into dynamic objects whose is purpose is, contrary to expectations about public sculpture, museum opening hours, until November 2.
